

#### NOT VISITING AN AVIARY

16mo. 38pp, [2]. With an engraved frontispiece, a further three engraved plates, and a terminal leaf of publisher's advertisements. Original publisher's printed red wrappers. Extremities rubbed, creased, and dust-soiled, substantial loss to spine. Later inked gift inscription to verso of upper wrapper, very short tears to gutter of frontispiece, occasional light spotting.

The sole edition, in original unsophisticated state, of Quaker author Frances Bowyer Miller's (1786-1854) juvenile jaunt, for which the publisher Darton paid her £4. The charming little story centres upon young siblings Julia and Felix, who early one morning accompany their parents on a ramble through the countryside after having been saddened to learn that they could not visit their uncle's aviary. They find solace in the discussion of the use of timber as a construction material.





## **DEATH IN MAURITIUS**

An apparently unrecorded edition of an affecting narrative of the untimely death of a pious seven-year-old boy whilst at Mauritius in 1836. The introductory remarks, by nonconformist divine William Jay (1769-1853), are dated 28th August, 1838 and were originally intended to preface the second impression, thus providing some indication of the initial date of publication.

The usual databases record two earlier British editions, both printed in 1840; a single copy of the fourth (Portland Public Library), and a single copy of the fifth (Bath and North East Somerset Council).



The first London edition, in French, of a history of Ancient Greece, intended for the use of Students of the Royal Military School in Paris. The 'abrégé de la fable' is a translation from poet and philologist Joseph de Jouvency's (1643-1719) Appendix de Diis et heroibus poeticis (1704) - itself a translation of the first two books of Pierre Gautruche's Histoire poétique pour l'intelligence des poètes et des auteurs anciens. Dilly issued a second edition in 1799.

William Godwin's (1756-1836) first book for children, published under his often-used pseudonym Edward Baldwin, profusely adorned with handsome copperplate illustrations commonly attributed to William Blake (1756-1827). The author's prefatory remarks clearly reveal his intentions behind writing the book, specifically his disapproval at comparable works: 'Half the fables which are to be found in the ordinary books end unhappily, or end in an abrupt manner. This is what a child does not like. The first question he asks, when he has finished his reading, if he is interested in the tale, is, What became of the poor dog, the fox, or the wolf?...I have accordingly endeavoured to make almost all my narratives end in a happy and forgiving tone, in that tone of mind which I would wish to cultivate in my child'.


The book received near universal critical praise from a diverse range of periodicals. *The British Critic* (November, 1805) wrote: "These Fables are better calculated to excite the attention of Children, to amuse and instruct them, than any we have ever perused. We recommend them without reserve.' *The Anti-Jacobin Review* was equally effusive: "They are unquestionably written on a much better plan for making an impression on, and conveying instruction to, those for whose use they are designed, than any other Fables which have fallen under our cognizance.' A remarkable endorsement given anti-Jacobin resentment of Godwin's earlier publications; indeed, the primary factor behind the adoption of a pseudonym had been as protection from their continued ire.

The sheets of this issue are identical to the first edition published in 1805, however the advertisement at the end of volume II offers up this 'New Edition' from the Juvenile Library, 41, Skinner Street - the premises purchased following the firms departure from their Hanway Street address in 1807, from which the first edition had emanated. Godwin himself, with the assistance of friends, had established the central London bookshop and publishers in Hanway Street (in the name of Thomas Hodgkins), persuading literary acquaintances to contribute work for the press, the most famous result being the Lambs' Tales from Shakespeare (1807). Following the move to Skinner Street, Finsbury, Godwin opened a subscription for a juvenile library which raised around £1,500. The bookshop and juvenile library absorbed most of Godwin's time between 1805 and 1815, a period in which he published occasional essays but no substantial philosophical or literary work.

# **ACTUALLY BY MARY SHELLEY?**

William St. Clair's copy, with his distinctive pencilled ownership inscription and manuscript note to recto of FFEP: 'Note advertisement leaves History of Greece 'in the press'.

A rare survivor, in the original state, of the second edition of a collection of seven tales for children, which contemporary advertisements by the publisher, under the 'Juvenile Library' imprint of Mary Jane Godwin (1768-1841), state was 'intended as a Companion to Miss Edgeworth's Parent's Assistant'.

Very much in the style, and format, of the series of juvenile tales which novelist and educationalist **Maria Edgeworth (1748-1849)** began to publish after 1796 - indeed at first glance they would be difficult to distinguish, upon a shelf - first edition of this work (1813) received positive reviews. *The Critical Review* noted that: 'These Tales are extremely well calculated to make a good impression upon the youthful mind, as the instructive is blended admirably with the amusing...The love of truth is here inculcated in so sensible and striking a manner, as cannot fail to attract the juvenile reader'.

So little is known of the author, Caroline Barnard, who appears to have composed just three well executed books for children (and indeed, is only credited to the title pages of two) - and all of which were published by Godwin's Juvenile Library - that at least one scholar has proposed that she may be a pseudonym for **Mary Shelley (1797-1851)**, the step-daughter of the publisher and author of *Frankenstein* (London, 1818).

Recently dispersed from the library of **William St. Clair (1937-2021)**, British scholar and senior civil servant, notable as the author of *The Godwins and the Shelleys, The Biography of a Family* (1989) and *The Reading Nation in the Romantic Period* (2004).

OCLC records copies of the second edition at only four locations; Berlin, BL, Minnesota, and UCLA (Vol. I only); COPAC adds no further locations in the UK.



A rare survival of the sole edition of George Brewer's (bap. 1766) adaptation, for a juvenile readership, of Richard Brinsley Sheridan's *Pizzarro* (1799); itself inspired by August von Kotzebue's dramatization of the Spanish conquest of the Inca Empire, *Die Spanier in Peru* (1796).

The Monthly Mirror (Vol. IX, February, 1800) reviewed the work favourably: 'these entertaining pages will be warmly patronized, since they tend to store the youthful mind with a new treasure of ideas, that may assist them to make just inferences, and to avoid the early prejudices of passion and inclination, which may mislead into false judgments and errors, detrimental to their future interests in life. Six short apologues are subjoined to the Life of Rolla, in which the fiction is pleasing, and the morality sound.'



A rare survival of an obscure early nineteenth-century educational board game wherein players learn history whilst progressing through the reigns of various English and British sovereigns, with the original rule book and preserved in the original slipcase.

The board consists of a hand-coloured engraved sheet mounted in 12 sections on a single folded sheet of linen; 53 illustrated panels in an oval, counter-clockwise, spiral track, surround the title and 'Rules of the game' engraved in centre of the board. In the booklet each of the 53 entries lists the name of the sovereign and the dates of accession and death. The first entry describes Egbert being crowned King of England, while entry 53, under George III, describes Bonaparte on board the Bellerophon in 1815. An additional final entry reads: '1817. This Game was published at Wallis's Juvenile Repository, 42, Skinner-street. - Whoever arrives here first is declared winner, and is recommended to proceed to the Publisher's, to purchase another Game, equally instructive and amusing.' The game requires counters, markers, and teetotum, not supplied by publisher.



Rare; OCLC locates a single copy of the 1817 first edition (UCLA), four copies of the third edition (Birmingham, Illinois, Morgan and Yale), and two copies of the fifth edition (Harvard and Princeton). COPAC adds two further undated copies (without the provision of edition statements), at Cambridge and V&A.





A handsome edition of Congregational minister and mission's activist in Africa John Campbell's (1766-1840) proselytising novel for children, which contemporary reviewers compared to *Robinson Crusoe*. First published in 1805, the narrative concerns two brothers, natives of Montpellier, who, for daring to convert to Protestantism, are banished by their Catholic community to the inhospitable 'Favourite Island' off the coast of South America. *The Eclectic Review* received the work favourably, but not wholly without criticism: 'It is a kind of spiritual Robinson Crusoe, and it is no bad imitation of the productions of that

fertile genius Daniel Defoe. If, however, it should succeed as well in making missionaries, as his celebrated work is said to have done in making sailors, we fear that it would be as difficult for them to meet with such savages as are here depicted, as it would be to find out the situation of "Favourite Island." The latter, we acknowledge, has puzzled us not a little. It is said to lie on the coast of California; yet the nearest inhabitants came from South America, and it was but little out of the way from Lima to France! If it were possible to recognise it by these marks, we would recommend a voyage thither to the French philosophers; as they would doubtless esteem their trouble well repaid, by the discovery of a nation of savages that appears to form an exception to the doctrine of human depravity.'

All editions are scarce. The usual databases record copies of this edition at only two locations (Florida and NLS).



The book is a spiritual sequel to Ellen Carrol, the previous title in the series. In would appear that both works were initially published by the American Sunday-School Union at Philadelphia in 1833 and 1834 respectively. No other British editions appear extant.

An apparently unrecorded one penny chapbook retelling of the perennially popular folk tale of Dick Whittington and his cat.

The publisher, a former ribbon warehouseman and sometime deacon of West Orchard Congregational church, Nathaniel Merridew, is primarily remembered for founding *The Coventry Herald* in 1808, a periodical intended to represent the Whig and dissenting interest in the town. The paper would ultimately evolve to become the recognised organ of the Liberals in Coventry. It continued to be run by the Merridew family until 1842 and in 1830 absorbed the more radical *Coventry Observer* to become the *Coventry Herald & Observer*.



The last-mentioned chapter (extracted from Gough's *History of Friends*) provides an account of a missionary and his party shipwrecked off the Gulf of Florida, subsequently captured by Native Americans, and stripped of their possessions. The survivors endured a harrowing two-hundred-mile journey by foot and canoe to St. Augustine, where they arrived in starving and wretched condition.

It is unclear whether Elliot's title is intended as a direct reference to Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice*, first published a decade earlier.

In contrast to many contemporary retellings, this interpretation is not sanitised - the sartorially showy simpleton is devoured by the wolf, who in turn, in a rather abrupt ending, is hacked to pieces by his victim's parents.

For discontent, Princess Aza is transformed to a swan. In the second part, the young boy disobeys and plays with a group of ne'er-do-wells, is consequently mistaken for a thief, and is kidnapped by travellers.

Aladdin promised to obey his uncle; and they separated, after the former had given his address.



The book contains sonnets to despair, simplicity, and disappointment, and poems on aquatic birds, genius, and enthusiasm – the majority of which are preceded by a short prose explanation 'illustrating, or more clearly defining, the moral truth; the philosophical fact; or the scenery contained in the Poetry'.

A second edition appeared in 1840, and American edition, printed at New York, in 1843.





An apparently unrecorded, provincially published edition of this popular East-Anglian morality tale on guardianship, which appeared from the late sixteenth-century as a broadside production and was variously published, in slip sheet and chapbook form, as *The Norfolk gentleman's last will and testament, The affecting history of the children in the wood*, and *The Babes in the Wood* in the intervening years.

Little is known of publisher J. Rosewarne beyond his birth in Wirksworth, a record of his time as a teacher in the Belper Wesley Sunday school, his succession of the Bridge Street premises of printer and bookseller Mr. Ogle, and, bizarrely, his weakness for toffee (Journal of the Derbyshire Archaeological and Natural History Society, Vol. XII, February, 1890).





Strickland states in her prefatory remarks: 'As national prejudices are generally imbibed in early youth, before reason obtains its proper influence on the mind, (although they are frequently matured, rather than dispelled, by riper years,) the following tale is expressly intended to point out to young people, what mischievous effects sometimes spring from the indulgence of such improper feelings toward foreigners.'



#### TRUANCY, TRAVELLERS, AND SLAVERY

A remarkably rare survival, in original state, of the third issue of William Francis Sullivan's (1756-1830), cautionary tale of juvenile delinquency, first printed in 1817. The cosseted young protagonists, Jonathan and Rebecca, possessed of an overly doting father and an imbecilic and egotistical mother each, separately, runaway from their respective boarding schools. The girl is soon taken in by a band of travellers who treat her with unmerciful cruelty to such a degree that when she is finally reunited with her family many months later her mother fails to recognise her. The boy's fate is equally bleak - for upwards of sixteen years he endures 'hardships past recounting', reduced for a time to 'slavery at Algiers' before returning to England as a vagabond. Again, on a chance encounter with a step-sibling, he at first goes unrecognised. The children, unsurprisingly, learn the error of their ways, each appreciating how ignorant they were of the comfort of their lives. Curiously, for a work intended for a juvenile readership, much is made of the mother's own Damascene conversion following the loss of her children, the realisation of her 'cruel and unnatural' maternal errors, and 'frivolous and empty vanity.'

The Dublin-born author, son of Jurist Francis Stoughton Sullivan (1715-1766), read at Trinity College. Intended for the church, he enlisted in the Royal Navy and served in the American War of Independence. In 1783 he settled in England and took up teaching; his experiences in education informing the narrative of his evangelical novel *The History of Mr. Rightway and his Pupils*, first published by Darton in 1816.






