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



A provincially published collection of verse, in original state, by Suffolk artist John Hugman (bap. 1770, d. 1846), including topical poems from the time of the Napoleonic Wars: 'On the greatness and fall of Buonaparte. As recited by the Author at a public dinner, April 18, 1814' and 'Monody on the death of the ever to be lamented Lord Nelson, Recited by the Author at a Public Dinner'. A seventeenth edition appeared by 1835.

All editions are scarce. COPAC and OCLC record a single copy of this eighth edition (BL).



The first edition of writer and artic exploration promotor Sir John Barrow's (1764-1848) biography of naval officer Richard Howe, Earl Howe (1726-1799). Howe forged an esteemed career with the Royal Navy, serving with distinction during the Seven Years' War, rising to the position of commander-in-chief of the fleet during the American War of Independence, and ultimately being appointed first lord of the Admiralty.

The second located copy of a striking promotional broadside documenting the position of the French fleet prior to the Battle of the Nile, published, five months after the event, by Robert Dodd as 'an accompanyment to his Four Historical Plates of that Glorious Victory'.

Marine painter and engraver **Robert Dodd** (1748-1815) began his career as a landscape painter. Though he achieved some recognition, he found true success as a painter of marine scenes, rising to become one of the foremost recorders of maritime actions of the French Revolution and the American War of Independence. From 1783 he himself engraved and published over 100 aquatints of his work, including views of the naval dockyards, and sets of engravings of Trafalgar and the Battle of the Nile. The latter are advertised here, with succinct descriptions for the four aquatints available for purchase, each of which depicted an aspect of the battle as it progressed; the initial attack at sunse; the burning of the French Admiral's ship the *Bellerophon*; the explosion, at midnight, of the same vessel; and the state of the battle the ensuing morning, showing the dismasted enemy ships.

In addition, the broadside features an accurate explanation of the formation of the French fleet prior to the action; and extracts from the *London Gazette* reproducing the dispatches of Rear-Admiral Sir Horatio Nelson, in which he provides lists of those killed or wounded during battle.

A single (mounted) copy is held by the National Maritime Museum. Unrecorded by the usual databases.



The first edition of this work was published in 1808 and became an immediate success with the British public. It is notable for the inclusion for the first time of a facsimile letter by Nelson (29th January, 1798).

The sole edition of a scarce compilation of anecdotes documenting the naval career of Lord Horatio Nelson; in particular his victories during the French Revolutionary and Napoleonic Wars - most notably the Battle of Trafalgar where he was to lose his life. The work is appended by a detailed account of the funeral ceremonies and a selection of poems commemorating his achievements by authors including Weeden Butler and Henry James Pye, the poet laureate. The account of the Battle of the Nile is taken word for word from Captain Edward Berry's (1768-1831) description. Little is known of the author, Adam Collingwood, a name perhaps supplied by the publisher in order to evoke Nelson's renowned friend and comrade, Admiral Cuthbert Collingwood.



The second located copy of provincially published sermon celebrating the victory of the Royal Navy at the Battle of Trafalgar: 'Their numbers both in ships and men, were far superior to ours; yet notwithstanding an evidently great disproportion, a most glorious victory ensues; a victory indeed! in some respects never equalled in the annals of naval history: an entire discomfiture of (at least) the flower and principal part of the enemy's fleet.'





The records of service of the fifty destroyers transferred from the United States Navy to the Royal Navy or Royal Canadian Navy in September, 1940 - each bearing the name of a North American town.






H.M.S. Castleton saw active duty in the North Atlantic as a convoy escort. In November 1940 she picked up all the survivors of two torpedoed steamships, Daydawn and Victoria. On 20th August 1942 she and H.M.S. Newark captured 51 survivors of the German submarine U-464 who had taken refuge in an Icelandic trawler. She was reduced to reserve at Grangemouth, Scotland, in 1945 and sold for scrap in 1947.

There is seemingly no record of how many copies were issued, nor indeed if one was distributed to each of the fifty towns associated with a destroyer.

OCLC records copies at six locations (Canadian Museum of History, Florida, Land Public Library, Navy Department, Rowan Public Library, and Victoria); COPAC adds no further.

Printed and publisher John Fairburn's (fl. 1789-1840) immensely popular chapbook memoir of Lord Nelson. The firm would issue two further related works; Fairburn's Edition of the Death of Admiral Lord Nelson (1806) and Fairburn's Edition of the Funeral of Admiral Lord Nelson (1806).

All editions are scarce; OCLC records copies at three locations (BL, Cork, and National library of Sweden); COPAC adds no further.





The first edition of Thomas Lediard's (1685-1743) monumental naval history. Included are accounts of naval battles, voyages of discovery to Africa, Asia and America (John and Sebastian Cabot, Frobisher to the arctic, Sir Francis Drake, Sir Humphrey Gilbert to Newfoundland), and account of the British colonies in America (Virginia, Nevis, Maryland).

Sir Graham Eden Hamond (1779-1862), respected naval officer notable for his commands during the French Revolutionary and Napoleonic Wars. Following a distinguished career, including a period serving as Commander-in-Chief, South American Station, Hamond attained the rank of Admiral of the Fleet.

A crisp copy, in original state, of the terms of the orders of council preventing neutral shipping trading with Continental Europe during the continuing hostilities of the Napoleonic Wars. By 1807 the conflict between England and France had degenerated into a war of economic retribution, as each side attempted to starve the other into submission. Nelson's victory at Trafalgar in October 1805 had given Britain mastery of the seas, but Napoleon still controlled much of continental Europe. Lacking a fleet that could directly threaten Britain, Napoleon implemented the Continental System, a pair of decrees (November 21, 1806, and December 17, 1807) that prohibited British trade with the Continent and threatened seizure of any neutral vessels found trading with England. The British responded by issuing the present orders of council (November 11, 18, and 25 and December 18, 1807) that imposed a counter-blockade on Napoleonic Europe, requiring non-partisan vessels to call at a British port for inspection and to pay duties and seek licenses there for trade with the enemy. In the midst of that economic vice was the neutral United States. The British embargo severely impeded American commercial activity in the Atlantic, and was ultimately a primary factor in the commencement of the Anglo-American War of 1812.



A well-preserved complete set of John Marshall's (1784?-1837) authoritative history of notable Royal Navy servicemen; his only published work. An unpretentious work, with no aspirations towards literary merit, this collection of biographies benefits greatly from the inclusion of copies of official or private letters, and other documents, making it of value to scholars of eighteenth-century maritime history. Evidently, many of the lives were contributed by the officers themselves, thus events are on occasion described in too favourable a manner; for his part Marshall does not pass critical judgement on the conduct he observes. Marshall himself served with the Royal Navy during the French Revolutionary and Napoleonic wars in numerous support vessels. He was promoted to the rank of lieutenant in 1815, at the conclusion of the latter conflict, but thereafter ceased to serve.

It was provoked by the publication of excerpts from a journal of Melasina Trench, or Mrs St. George (published in the *London Times* during October 1861) which recorded a drunken and uncouth Nelson. Matcham's defence includes a rather touching description of the uncle he visited 'twice during the short periods in which he was on shore...once in 1802....and the second time at his house at Merton, in 1805, for three weeks preceding the 13th of September, when he left that place to embark at Portsmouth to return no more'.



In addition, there are entries relating to the history of the Matcham estates at Hampworth, Woodfalls, and Newhouse. The latest date recorded in the manuscript in 1813.

In 1841/2 he ceased active naval service, and went on half-pay, moving his family to Wakefield. In 1870 he was made Rear-Admiral, and in 1875 Vice-Admiral.

Cagliari, January 25, 1793.

ON the 21st Instant, a French Ship of the Line and a Bomb Ketch appeared before the Island of St. Peter, which was immediately furrendered to the French, the Commandant having previously retired to this Place with a Detachment of 800 Men, and such Provisions as they could bring with them, and spiked the Cannon they left behind. The French have also taken the Island of Antioch.

Yesterday the French Fleet, consisting of Nineteen Ships of the Line, anchored in this Harbour. The Admiral sent a Detachment of Twenty Men on Shore, with the National Flag, and an Officer, who demanded the Surrender of the Place; but the Lieutenant of the Port cautioned them not to advance; and when they arrived near the Pratick-House, the Sardes killed the Drummer and Sixteen others; the Rest retreated to the Ship. It is expected that the Town will be bombarded this Morning.

THE following intelligence has been received at the East India House:

AFTER the capture of Hinglaiz-Ghur by the Detachment under the command of the Honorable Lieutenant-Colonel Monson, as stated in the Calcutta Gazette of the 26th of July, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson advanced his position about fifty miles from the Mokundra Pass, in which position he was informed that he would be able to procure supplies. Colonel Monson also expected to be able to communicate with Colonel Murray, at that time on his march, with a considerable detachment of Troops, from Guzerat towards Oujein.

The Corps under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Monson consisted of five battalions of Sepoys, with a proportion of Artillery, and of two bodies of irregular Horse, under the command of Lieutenant Lucan, and of a Native Chieftain, named Bapojee Scindiah, amounting to about three thousand men.

On the 7th July, 1804, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson received intelligence that Jeswunt Rao Holkar,

A remarkably rare survival, in original unsophisticated state, of an anonymous early biography of Nelson, primarily devoted to his victory at Trafalgar. Though frustratingly undated, it would appear that the present pamphlet is one of the earliest published accounts of the Battle of Trafalgar. The work reprints an extract from Admiral Richard Strachan's (1760-1828), account of his capture of enemy vessels off the coast of Cadiz, initially published in the *Gazette Extraordinary* on the 11th November, 1805. A printed publisher's statement to the verso of the title page reads as follows: "This Pamphlet would have been issued from the press on Saturday last, 9th, but the delay was in order to render it more perfect, as the rumour of another Victory was circulated in all parts. We have this morning been enabled, by the publication of the Extraordinary Gazette, to finish with another happy instance of British naval superiority. There remains nothing to add here, but that the greatest care has been taken to render the dates exact, extracting the materials from the most respectable publications of the day'.

COPAC records a single copy (Cambridge); OCLC adds no further. A 'fourth edition', also presumed to have been printed in 1805, is recorded at Manchester; no further editions appear extant.



An entirely unrecorded printing of three additional verses, celebrations of the naval prowess and ultimate sacrifice of Admiral Lord Nelson 'Who dar'd to die to keep us free', to the popular British national air Rule Britannia, first performed as part of Thomas Arne's Alfred, a Masque first performed at Cliveden in 1740, to celebrate the anniversary of the accession of King George II.

Collections of naval songs and periodicals contemporary to Nelson's death at Trafalgar reveal that the first two these three verses (incipit: 'The pride, the glory of our state' and 'Rest, rest, in peace bright honours son') were composed by Mr Male, and delivered on stage at the Drury Lane Theatre by 'Messrs Dignum and Gibbon'. The third (incipit: 'Again the loud ton'd trumpt of fame') was apparently composed by 'Mr Ashley, of Bath' and performed by the noted tenor Charles Incledon at the Covent Garden Theatre.

We can find no separately printed songster edition of these patriotic verses in COPAC or OCLC.

In 1798 he was made an admiral, but the rank was purely nominal. Despite repeated petitions, he was never given a command throughout the Napoleonic Wars. In 1811, he was appointed to the honorary position of Admiral of the Fleet. He would later come to be dubbed the 'sailor king'.

Printed in July 1884, these Standing Orders for the Channel Squadron of the Royal Navy were issued in very limited numbers; the printing code notes just 65 copies of this work. They would, presumably, only have been issued to the Captains of the ships forming the Squadron protecting the home waters of the English Channel, and the respective responsible naval officers at ports and at the Admiralty.

This copy, numbered as 60, would have been used by Captain **Richard Frederick Britten (1843-1910)**, who commanded the Ironclad HMS *Minotaur* between March 10th 1884 and July 27th 1885, as she operated with the Evolutionary Squadron.

COPAC and OCLC together locate just two copies in institutional libraries, at the NMM and Plymouth.





There is mention of a Lieutenant Ormond, this is potentially Francis Ormond, made Lieutenant on 3rd December 1810, and appointed to the frigate Endymion in 1813 off the North coast of America. During the War of 1812, he commanded a division of boats, under the orders of Captain Robert Barrie, an expedition up the Penobscot river, Maine, to capture American territory, culminating in the Battle of Hampden. He served under the same officer in the action which led to the capture of the American frigate President, in January of 1815; and was second lieutenant of the Impregnable at the Battle of Algiers in 1816. The presence of Ormond's name in the manuscript under the heading of '2 division', would suggest that the list was compiled in conjunction with the actions at Maine in 1814.

A Worcester-printed sermon preached by Church of England clergyman James Stillingfleet (bap. 1729, d. 1817). Owing to Nelson's first dispatches being intercepted, confirmation of the British victory in the first days of August 1798 - which represented one of the most significant reversals of fortune in the naval Age of Sail, securing supremacy of the Mediterranean for the Royal Navy - did not reach England until 2nd October. Jubilant celebrations erupted around the country. Stillingfleet compared the victory to God's intervention on behalf of the Israelites in Egypt, and was effusive in his praise for the conduct of the Royal Navy: 'A General of most ambitious an intrepid Spirit...with a large Army under his Command, flushed with success in former repeated Victories, is suffered under the direction of a wise and superintending Providence, to make good his landing at Alexandria...In this critical moment, while the ships which conveyed this Army to the Coast of Egypt remained yet in a Bay near the mouth of the Nile, our Gallant English Admiral arrived with the Squadron under his Command. At this time it may with truth be said that the LORD God of Israel of old, now the God of Christians, interposed in a most wonderful manner our deliverance...Perhaps there never was a more decisive, nor a more brilliant victory obtained, which reflected greater honour upon the skill and bravery of the British Navy.'
